
Where newcomers become old friends

#### July 10 Speaker



Newcomer member Stan Zygmunt will spin local history tales around the Uintah Toll Road completed in 1905 from Dragon Junction to Vernal and Fort Duchesne. Find out why investors sank serious money into building not only the toll road, but the world's steepest and crookedest railroad across the Bookcliffs. Learn how the names Mack, Baxter, and McAndrews are related to a unique material called Gilsonite. Find out what Henry Ford, Aldophus Busch, chewing gum, wet sheep, and 80,000 bricks have in common. And time permitting, Stan will tell us how that baby-blue warehouse that can be seen from I-70 west of Fruita ties United Kingdom nuclear reactors to Gilsonite.

First Vice President Tom Politzer called the meeting to order at 10 am, since President Gary Fitzpatrick is traveling. He asked for a motion to approve the May meeting minutes, as published in the club newsletter. Ruth Anna so moved and Jerry Norton seconded the motion. Minutes were approved by voice vote among those attending.

**Treas. Bill Gates** reported that club finances are "in good shape," with \$2,457.20 in checking and \$7,680.39 in reserve accounts, including one Certificate of Deposit.

Vice President Tom thanked **Tanya Davis** for the morning's coffee and delicious assortment of treats. She in turn shared the thanks with her refreshments committee. Members with June birthdays also were recognized.

**Linda Ash** of We Care said the group must be staying healthy because she sent only one greeting card during the past month -- a get well card to **Dianne Leeth**, who had knee surgery.

Larrayne Zygmunt of the membership committee reported that four new members signed up: Deane and Marilyn Drury from Heath, Ohio; Jessica Seeny from Raleigh, N.C.; and Lisa Rischar from Fort Lauderdale, Fla.

**Ken Seitz** issued a final reminder about the June 27 wine tasting event from 4-6 pm at the Art Center. Cost is \$25/person to taste an assortment of French wines, including from the Burgundy and Alsace regions. He also updated

the group on the annual Labor Day barbecue, set for Monday, September 2, from 5-8 p.m. at Canyon View Park. Because Newcomers has reserved the pavilion, which can accommodate150 people, seating will be on a first-come first-seated basis. Cost for the barbecue will be \$13/person for members and \$15/person for non-member guests. A sign-up form is included in this newsletter.

Douglas Grodt, who heads the hiking group, answered frequently-asked questions about hiking activity when the weather turns hot: Yes, the group will continue hiking throughout the summer. And no, the hikes won't be scheduled for early-morning hours to escape the heat. Instead, the hiking group will head to the Grand Mesa, where higher elevations translate into markedly cooler temperatures. Douglas provides details of upcoming hikes through group emails, sent to his distribution list, which currently includes 137 Newcomers members. Ruth Anna alerted the group to a June 23 "Sippin' in the Stacks" fund-raising event for the Mesa County Public Library Foundation, a non-profit that supports the library's "extra" programs. While public libraries receive government funding, those dollars only cover basic services. The Foundation raises money for additional community programs, including Summer Reading and Comic.con, plus Adult Learning Center classes on adult literacy, GED preparation, English as a Second Language and citizenship. While the June 23 event is coming fast, Ruth noted that others take place throughout the year.

**Stan Zygmunt** said Midday with New Dimensions will offer two upcoming programs -- "Crisis on the Colorado River" on September 10 from noon-1 p. at Mesa County's new Clifton Branch Library and a discussion of Colorado's bats on October 8 at the Central Library. More detail will be available as the dates near.

**Susan Norton** said that the Music in the Grapevines summer concert series at Two Rivers Winery is in full swing; the next concert is July 16 at 7:30 pm, featuring Exit 42. Doors will open at 6:30 pm. Despite the later-than-usual start, the concert will still be two hours long. Tickets purchased in advance are \$20/person; those

purchased at the door are \$25/person. Proceeds support the Art Center of Western Colorado.

Guest speaker Dalida Sassoon Bolliq, CEO of Grand Junction's Business Incubator Center. described the center's driving mission as breaking the boom-and-bust economic cycle that plagued the Grand Valley for decades and creating a more resilient, vibrant business climate. Founded in 1986, the center fosters economic growth in a wide range of industries by providing promising start-ups with free business consultation and support. The center can provide gap lending -- up to \$300,000 to businesses that don't have established relationships with traditional lenders -and run interference with local, county, state and federal programs. It also offers technical resources, equipment and operating space to get fledgling businesses, including agribusinesses, up and running. Within five years, those businesses are expected to be financially viable -and able to create new jobs in the community. The Business Incubator also has begun working with non-profit organizations, since they provide a sizable number of local jobs.

During 2023, the GJ Business Incubator helped businesses create 745 new full-time jobs that pay \$55,000/year or more -- higher than the local median income of \$48,000/year. It also provided \$1.79 million in direct loans to start-up businesses (or some struggling established businesses) and facilitated \$1.97 million in loans from third parties. Vice President Tom concluded the meeting at 11:10 am.

#### New Dimensions Lifelong Learning Institute News

#### **New Dimensions volunteers**

are hard at work developing new classes for the fall term, working toward offering 80 classes for the term with half of those being new classes. The class catalog will be available online September 4. Registration opens September 11 and closes September 16. Classes start September 30 and end November 15.

Midday with New Dimensions offers a one-hour lecture titled Colorado's Bats: Their Values and Challenges, presented by Dan Neubaum at the Mesa County Central Library, at noon, on Thursday, August 8. Dan is a Wildlife Biologist with Colorado Parks and Wildlife, having worked with bats for over 20 years.

Dan will give a brief background of bats that occur in Colorado, explain their unique traits, their benefits to the ecosystem, and the challenges that arise when their world and ours overlap, describe equipment used to study bats, and explain the impacts of white-nose syndrome, a fungus outbreak discovered in Colorado bats.

Midday with New Dimensions is a partnership between Mesa County Libraries and New Dimensions Lifelong Learning, offering a free public lecture the second Thursday at noon every other month. Seating is first come, first served. Lecture information can be found on the Mesa County Libraries event calendar at https://mesacountylibraries.org/events/.

Midday is expanding, adding two lectures at the new Clifton Library. Midday with New Dimensions/Clifton lectures are scheduled for Tuesday, September 10, and Tuesday, January 14. Newcomers member, Mark Hermunstad, will be presenting a lecture titled Crisis on the Colorado River for the September 10 Midday/Clifton. Mark is a retired attorney with 40 years experience in water law and related issues.

The lecture will cover the Colorado River Compact and the Law of the River, how water flows in the Colorado River drainage have been affected by the changing climate, current negotiations between the states and directives from the federal government regarding dwindling water supplies, and how all of this could impact the Grand Valley.
